Calculating how long you need your photographer for:

Having a good idea of how many hours you'll need your photographer for is a great starting place when looking at different packages. If you have a planner or day of coordinator who has given you a detailed timeline, then that will give you the exact number of hours you'll need. If you don't have a day of timeline yet, this will help you calculate a general idea of how long you'll need your photographer for. They may have a different idea of length of time for various parts, but this will give you a good idea.
